

Legacy Pediatrics' Vaccine Policy

We firmly believe in the effectiveness of vaccines to prevent serious illness and to save lives. We would be devastated if one of our patients suffered serious consequences of an illness that could have been prevented by a routine vaccine. Vaccinating children and young adults may be the single most important health-promoting intervention we perform as health care providers, and that you can perform as parents/caregivers. **The recommended vaccines and their schedule by the American Academy of Pediatrics are the results of decades of scientific study and data gathering on millions of children by thousands of our brightest scientists and physicians. We are committed to following the best available scientific evidence on vaccines.**

We believed in the safety of our vaccines. All available literature, evidence and current studies show that vaccines do not cause autism or other developmental disabilities. Although we use thimerosal-free vaccines, we firmly believe that thimerosal, a preservative that has been in vaccines for decades and remains in some vaccines, does not cause autism or other developmental disabilities.

We recognized that there has always been and will likely always be misinformation surrounding vaccination, including from our current Center of Disease Control (CDC) and federal government. The vaccine campaign is truly a victim of its own success. It is precisely because vaccines are so effective at preventing illness that we are even discussing whether they should be given. Because of vaccines, many of you have never seen a child with polio, tetanus, whooping cough, bacterial meningitis, or even chickenpox, or known a friend or family member whose child died of one of these diseases.

Alternative or delayed vaccine schedules can compromise immunity and leave individuals vulnerable to preventable diseases. The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) suggests that delaying vaccinations likely increases overall stress due to the need for more frequent doctor visits for shots. Following the recommended schedule ensures optimal protection and helps maintain herd immunity within the community.

We therefore firmly believe, and require at our practice, that all children and young adults receive the recommended vaccines according to the schedule published by the American Academy of Pediatrics. **We reserve the right to dismiss any family from the practice who chooses not to adhere to the recommended/required vaccine schedule.**

As medical professionals, we feel very strongly that vaccinating children on schedule with currently available vaccines is absolutely the right thing to do both for those children and for the safety of infants at our office who are too young to be immunized.
